It was fun night and hopefully we can sell all the tickets next time. We are looking into a suitable movie with several options having been suggested already.





Hi All

I just thought that I would share a recent project I carried out on my Morris Minor.

I have blinkers fitted to my Morrie, so my old trafficators (or semifores) were hanging around doing nothing, and with the introduction of L.E.D flashing bulbs for trafficators.

I wondered if I could wire both up in unison and have double the signalling power.

So, using two Tridon TR051pac relays purchased from Repco (these are 70 amp so can handle the trafficator coils with ease. And two L.E.D flashing festoon bulbs obtained from Hawkeswood, or apparently from Buzzbugs at 290 Prestons Rd ChCh

The pins on the relays are numbered 30, 85, 86 and 87 and are wired thus, 30 goes to a live circuit preferably one that shuts down when you turn off ignition, 85 to earth, 86 to wiring of blinker lights left and right, and 87 to the trafficator. Do not attempt to wire to your existing blinker relay as this will only cause your trafficators to go in and out in time with your blinker lights.

I taped both relays' together and made a bracket out of sheet metal and attached it to the relays with a couple of strong cable ties. I then mounted it under the bonnet near the cut-out.

So, all in all a satisfying project over a couple of rainy days.

I happened to lock eyes on an advert for the convention on Facebook, commented on the link that we would love to come but there was no way we could afford to take one of our Morris Minors over there and the reply, very quickly came back, from an incredibly generous man called Mark Gauci from The Morris Car Club of South Australia "We can lend you a Morris Minor.".

Well, I almost couldn't contain myself! Risking life and limb by interrupting my beloved while he was concentrating on his own computer mission, I mentioned the Convention and the offer of a car, a big grin quickly formed on his face and he said, "Looks like we're going to Adelaide!"

The anticipation was almost as good as the event but there was a great deal to organize and plan. For Brian it was whether or not to bring his rocker cover racer, for me it was organizing flights and accommodation, then deciding if I could fit my rocker cover racer AND all my outfits??! I didn't really need to decide, my rocker cover weighs 3kg and that equates to quite a few pairs of shoes!

Meeting Mark and his wife Margie a few months later we realized that not only was he incredibly generous and kind, but he was also very busy! As one of the organizers (in charge of sponsorship and marketing) of such a big event he was in his back shed with several other club members filling goodie bags when we arrived. He declined our offers of help, instead insisting we meet our mode of transport for the next few days, the beautiful Monti!

There were definitely some nerves as we negotiated our way through this currently unknown city, but Monti got us back to the cabin and the next morning we spent finding our bearings and the best way to get to the venue where the convention would begin.

Over the next few days, we met many people and created some great connections. I know that as Kiwis we like to hassle our Australian neighbours but honestly, everyone we talked to was so kind and we didn't have any gripes or bad memories of the event.

Many of the cars, vans and Utes had non-standard engines just like they do here but possibly a higher percentage which is likely due to the higher km's they need to travel. The high standard of the vehicles and the event was definitely comparable to those here but obviously on a much larger scale. Around 130 cars were involved which made for a huge amount of eye candy! We visited an Aircraft Museum, Car Museum, a vineyard called The Cube and were encouraged to travel in outfits that reflected the year of our cars which rounded things off nicely, especially for someone with a costume cupboard the size of mine!

The last day was spent at a place called The Bend, which is a well-known racetrack. Our Morris Minors were declared the largest number and the slowest cars to ever enter the track.... that didn't dampen anyone's spirits and there was definitely some jostling going on, all captured on the drone footage which was gathered every day and made for some sensational videos once the convention was over.




